Winchester Elementary School Visits Yoncalla Early Learning Center

Recently, Yoncalla School District hosted a visit from key staff and administration from Winchester Elementary School in Roseburg. The visit was in response to a growing interest in the authentic parent engagement approaches throughout the district, modeled after our Early Works project. Yoncalla School District is being recognized throughout Douglas County for our Early Works project.

Rick Synder, Winchester Elementary Principal, is interested in replicating key components of our strategies with the intention creating a broader understanding of the families within their district. A key takeaway for Mr. Synder was the importance of building trusting relationships with all families to best meet student's needs. Yoncalla School District shared their successes in increasing parent involvement and improving learning outcomes in part because of these relationships.

The tour included a visit to the Yoncalla Preschool with conversations with both staff and preschoolers. Megan Barber shared her strategies for meeting the needs of our youngest students, including an overview of our newest classroom behavior management approach, Conscious Discipline. The preschoolers were actively engaged in learning activities and demonstrated the importance of high quality early learning programs and how it impacts Kindergarten readiness. In addition, the visit included a tour of our Early Head Start classroom, the Family Room, and our new parent education room. The most powerful part of the visit was a conversation with a Yoncalla School District parent, Sherry Hargraves. Sherry and her partner are parenting a preschooler and Kindergartener. Sherry shared her initial hesitation to becoming an involved parent, and how she came to love volunteering and working with district staff. She also shared that her school involvement led her family to being more involved in the community, including coaching T Ball, attending a parenting class and connecting with other families.

Yoncalla Elementary Holds Talent Show

Grades K-6th recently held a talent show. It is something that is scheduled to be an annual event, that is being reawakened. We started with special a musical performance by Mrs. AK and her daughters Farah and Fiona that combined singing, a tambourine, and the playing of an ukulele. As this school year winds down, things are getting busy in the shop area...The 25" planer finally arrived. With the assistance of Jeff Schmeichel, it is hooked up and working great. During the first week of operation, we were able to complete a planning project for a member of the community. We were able to plane 1350 board feet of cedar and pine boards. We were able to sell the clean shavings from this project to reinvest in the shop program.

We also took delivery of our new laser engraving machine. We hope to have it up and running before the end of school this year. This new equipment is vital for the shop program as it will help prepare students for the workplace that makes up today's economy.

and I was blown away. A "fashion show" was held where each of the women went on stage with their gear and explained what it was they did and what the gear was for. I was impressed by the competence and strength these women displayed.

National Geographic Program

These last few months, Ms. Wilde has worked on professional development called the National Geographic educator program. The Educator Certification program equips educators with the resources and training needed to teach students about the world in innovative, interdisciplinary ways. Benefits of certification include professional recognition; connection to a community of like-minded educators; and access to resources, mentorship, and leadership opportunities with National Geographic. Through this program, educators will learn about the National Geographic mission, how to teach interdisciplinary through various scales and perspectives, and the National Geographic Learning Framework—all while applying these ideas to their own work and collaborating with educators worldwide.

Following the protocol, Ms. Wilde taught a lesson from the National Geographic teaching resources and then developed a hands-on lesson for her Natural Resource class that included many principles of the NG Learning Framework. Her chosen lesson from the teaching resources was a lesson on the Bay of Pigs. Her real love, though, is Natural Resources. She developed a lesson where students made Biltmore sticks and diameter tapes, both used to measure the size of trees to determine how many board feet exist within a given tree. It involved measuring skills, math principles, and some artistic license. For a capstone project, Ms. Wilde made a video describing how the equipment is made and how it is used.

Ms. Wilde is pleased to be part of the National Geographic education family, with all of its supports and resources.


Yoncalla School District Priorities

Your favorite teaching moment?


Being able to reopen up the Little Theater as a drama performance space and to teach drama and acting for a number of years.


What are you going to miss about Yoncalla?


