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## **Child Nutrition Programs**

After many frustrating years of having the food service program at Yoncalla School District running in the red, YSD is excited to announce that all students attending YSD will be fed breakfast and lunch free. What this means is that there will now be more food for all students no matter what their financial standing. The District decided this summer to apply for the state Community Eligibility Provision.

The Community Eligibility Provision fully funds meals for schools if at least 40% of the student population falls under one of various highneed categories. Their households could qualify for food stamps, for instance. Their children could be migrant students, foster children or experiencing homelessness.

In Yoncalla, both of the district's schools qualify for the program. Ap-



proximately 65% of families in Douglas County qualify for free and reduced lunch, according to Children First For Oregon. For a number of years, the YSD has spent time processing free and reduced lunch forms. Now, the state Department of Education announces how many students in each school falls under those high-need categories and that's that.

We are proud that no student will ever attend YSD and be denied a meal.

### Early Works BBQ

Yoncalla School District kicked off the new school year with a Yoncalla Early Works retreat and community barbeque. The event was filled with facts, food and fun. Parents, students, staff, regional and state stakeholders and the community gathered early in the afternoon to begin discussions focused on 4 topics that included improving attendance through a culture of parent partnerships, celebrating success with Yoncalla School Districts new attendance protocols, barriers to attendance at the high school level and supporting attendance through health and wellness.

The retreat was well attended with approximate 100 stakeholders and community members in attendancefor the retreat and many more who joined in the barbeque. Representatives from the Ford Family Foundation and Children's Institute were involved with a timeline activity that helped to identify the evolution of the Yoncalla Early Works initiative and Portland State University presented data to the group that supports the remarkable progress that has been made with the Yoncalla Pre-school.

After the retreat, there was a BBQ for attendees and the community at large. People enjoyed hotdogs, BBQ chicken and several other items from the local Yoncalla Bakery. The night offered families, staff and the community a chance to get better acquainted with the Yoncalla School District staff and Board members. Fun was had by all!

### **Building Renovation News**

As many of you know, YHS was approved for two seismic retrofits at the high school. We are currently in the second year of the retrofit with Phase 1 complete. Phase 1 included an expansion of the office area that includes development of the office area, reroofing of the entire structure, HVAC in all classrooms, exterior painting of the entire stucture and the removal of the glass blocks with installation of new windows.

Phase 2 included work on the gym. Most of the grant money was spent on the strengthening of the trusses. There was also a portion of the grant spent on removal of the old glass blocks and installation of new windows in the gym. Phase 2 is just about complete with only wall matts remaining. These matts have been ordered and should be installed by the middle of October.

Phase 3 of the project is money that the Yoncalla School Board approved to lower the stage, build a new classroom and install a new gym floor. This phase of the project is currently in process. The stage has been lowered and the new weight room is opened. The new classroom is currently being used with more work to be done. There still needs to be windows and a new bathroom installed. The gym floor is currently being installed with new bleachers coming in October.

We are excited to work with our current students and staff to continue planning for the future of the Yoncalla School District. These new additions will help house the increasing number of students attending YHS. We believe the small growing pains this year will lead to even greater opportunities next year allowing YHS to more fully realize its potential of being a small school striving for big results.

## 10 Facts About School Attendance

- 1. Absenteeism in the first month of school can predict poor attendance throughout the school year. Half the students who miss 2-4 days in September go on to miss nearly a month of school.
- 2. Over 8 million U.S. students miss nearly a month of school each year.
- 3. Absenteeism and its ill effects start early. One in 10 kindergarten and first grade students are chronically absent.
- 4. Poor attendance can influence whether children read proficiently by the end of third grade or be held back.
- 5. By 6th grade, chronic absence becomes a leading indicator that a student will drop out of high school.
- 6. Research shows that missing 10 percent of the school, or about 18 days in most school districts, negatively affects a student's academic performance. That's just two days a month and that's known as chronic absence.
- 7. Students who live in communities with high levels of poverty are four times more likely to be chronically absent than others often for reasons beyond their control, such as unstable housing, unreliable transportation and a lack of access to health care.
- 8. When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances for graduating.
- 9. Attendance improves when schools engage students and parents in positive ways and when schools provide mentors for chronically absent students.
- 10. Most school districts and states don't look at all the right data to improve school attendance. They track how many students show up every day and how many are skipping school without an excuse, but not how many are missing so many days in excused and unexcused absence that they are headed off track academically.



### **Investing in Our Future**

Investing in Career Technical Education (CTE) has been a major focus of Yoncalla High School over the past 2 years. The shop program has invested over \$80,000 in new equipment to upgrade the shop and be able to teach its students how to compete for new jobs in the work place. This year the school invested a substantial amount of money into upgrading the wielding equipment. The investment is from the High School Success grant (Measure



98) money that has been awarded to YHS.

New YHS Welding Instructor Jesse McHaffie is excited about teaching students the art of welding and helping them work towards skills that will help them to achieve a career with a livable wage. Students in the program love the new equipment and understand the importance of proper safety equipment in the workplace. YHS received new safety goggles, ear plugs, welding gloves, coats and

much more, along with MIG welding accessories. As with any manufacturing job, time equals money. Because the MIG welding process is faster, it's also more cost-effective. MIG parts are also more readily available and far less expensive than TIG. This is why YHS has made the conversion from TIG to MIG welding.

## **Parlevous Espanol ?**

After several years of no foreign language at Yoncalla High School the District has hired Brooklyn Edera as the new Spanish teacher at YHS. After sharing a Spanish teacher with North Douglas for a number of years, YHS decided to make an investment in its students and its future and hire a full time Foreign Language teacher for the 2019-20 school year. Edera



will be responsible for several sections of Spanish including Spanish classes for its middle school which includes both 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades. Edera will also be responsible for teaching several other electives within the high school. After a 4-year absence, 27 students signed up for the middle school Spanish class along with 22 signed up for the Spanish 1 high school class.

Principal Brian Berry said, "We are incredibly excited to bring Brooklyn on board to help our students begin to focus on their future. This investment will also help our students access postsecondary opportunities that would not have been available to them without this investment."
