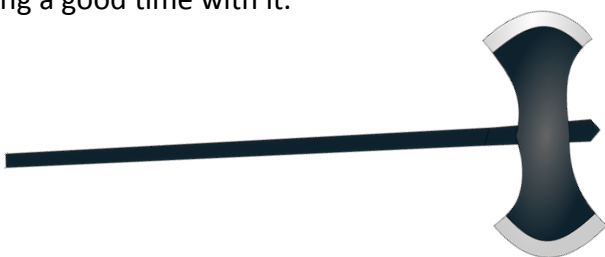
FNRL

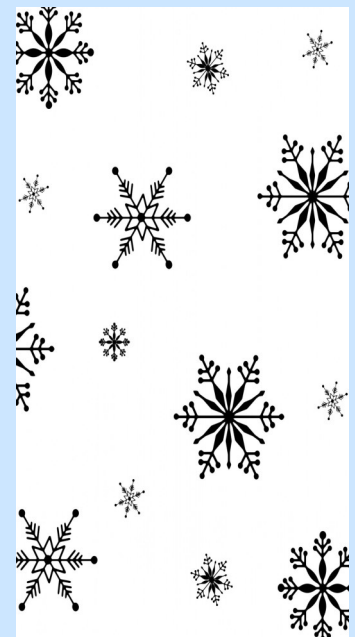

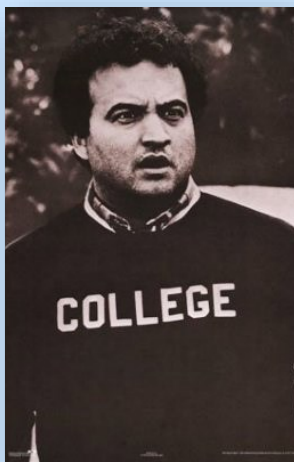

Guest clinicians were Julie Cherry of Roseburg High School and Stacey Atwell-Keister of Yoncalla High School. The singers performed a variety of folk songs and classical literature in English, Korean, Latin, Swahili, and indigenous South American languages.

Nearly 80 students from Douglas County performed in the concert, which featured percussionists, vocal soloists, and a recorder/percussion ensemble.

Each Fall, the Yoncalla High School Leadership Class coordinates the Annual Canned Food Drive with the Yoncalla Food Bank to raise donations for local families. Despite several last-minute deliveries, we unfortunately were short of our goal with only 1,067 items.

Despite not meeting our goal, the Leadership class was happy to make their delivery to the Yoncalla Community Center on Thursday November 14th. The Leadership class was able to donate SIX Costco sized totes of food with four additional boxes and even needed some help loading it all up into the delivery truck as some totes were just too heavy to lift.
