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When Should My Student Stay Home From School?

Hello all and Happy October! As we head in cold and flu as well as allergy season I would like to review when students should stay home from school. With the extra precautions we are taking this year due to COVID-19 things look a little different than they have in the past.

IF MY STUDENT HAS ANY OF THESE THEY CAN NOT GO TO SCHOOL

- Fever of 100.4 or higher
- Persistent cough that affects their activity
- Difficulty catching their breath or get tired easily
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- A new rash with any open skin or sores
- Unusual tiredness or low activity tolerance

IF MY STUDENT HAS ANY OF THESE THEN IT IS BEST THAT THEY STAY HOME

- Abdominal pain
- Congestion
- Sore throat
- Head ache
- Loss of smell or taste
- Body aches

If your student is kept home with any of the above symptoms please contact the school and the District Nurse will be notified to follow up. We'll talk about what is going on and when your student can return to school, usually 24 hours after symptoms start to get better.

Remember, our first defense is good hand washing, good cough/sneeze etiquette, and wearing masks properly.



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
