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Yoncalla High School Gets Seismic Retrofitting

An historic Yoncalla school building is getting new life. Yoncalla High School is approximately 65 years old and is undergoing a seismic retrofitting, thanks to two seismic grants totaling nearing 3 million dollars in state grant money.


The sounds of saws, hammers and shovels have filled the air throughout this summer. After battling water issues, heat issues and countless other structural issues the past few years, the building is getting a new lease on life. "The reports of the building's demise are highly exaggerated," joked principal Brian Berry. "With these improvements, this building is going to be here for a while. YHS is not going anywhere!"

The project has been broken into two phases. Phase One, which has been going on throughout the summer, has seen several structural upgrades including shear walls, new windows (replacing the old glass block) expansion of the office area and a new roof. Phase Two will begin in October and will include structural improvements in the gym and Little Theater.

A key element of this project is improving the look of the building while making sure to keep the charm of the old structure of Yoncalla High School. Along with the seismic improvements, the District is also adding money from their building's budget to ensure that upgrades are made to the heating system that will allow classrooms to be regulated by thermostats.

Other improvements that will be included in Phase Two include the lowering of the stage and expansion of the shop area. The goal is to find a way to bring the library into the main building. "For safety reasons, we would like to have our students in the building, and not have them go outside to go to a classroom," stated Berry.

Phase Two is schedule to be completed in the summer of 2019.

Yoncalla School District receives Curriculum Grant

The Yoncalla School District is getting a \$75,000 grant from the Ford Family Foundation in the form of a Douglas County School Innovation Grant. The Ford Family Foundation was established in 1957 by Kenneth W. and Hallie E. Ford. Its mission is "successful citizens and vital rural communities" in Oregon and Siskiyou County, California. The Foundation is located in Roseburg, Oregon, with a Scholarship office in Eugene.

The grant money will be dispersed in different amounts over the next two years to grades K-12 in the district. The first year's grant disbursement is \$35,000. Grades K-6 will be purchasing new reading and math curriculum, while the high school will focus on language arts and science. This grant and the professional training that will come with it will help to update and replace curriculum that is antiquated, at best. "We are in dire need of new curriculum and this update will help YSD to begin to update its curriculum," stated Yoncalla Elementary School principal Kelly Campbell.

The lack of relevant curriculum has hindered YSD for several years. "We have been teaching with limited and outdated curriculum for a number of years," stated Campbell. Curriculum is important in education because it helps teachers deliver an effective education. It can set standards, goals and learning outcomes that help students move from grade level to grade level.

Yoncalla's schools will be prioritizing teacher training with the new curriculum. This training will help support staff with on-going training of the curriculum. Principals at each school will oversee and ensure that teachers are proficient and understand all elements of the new curriculum.


